



world continues to be at the centre of our democratically elected government — irrespective of who ends up with the more numbers.

Over the past few months the Inner Sydney Voice Team has engaged with a number of community members, local organisations, key advocates and peak groups. There were some key, recurring themes that all lead to one spot. At the end of the day people are looking for ways to meaningfully contribute to political discourse and to be taken seriously.

Politicians, powered by their political machines are out promising us stuff if we vote for them. They know that every vote matters and with over 10% of the

total vote across NSW, the Inner Sydney Region could be the region to change the game.

Labor needs to win this election. They think it is about time the Liberal-National Coalition — dealing with their own scandals and dysfunction — steps aside. The Greens are fighting to keep what they have — Newtown and Balmain — and the Independents are saying, "Here we come, ready or not!"

What we know is that to win government a party needs 47 seats in the Legislative Assembly — that's where your local member fits in — and 22 seats in the Legislative Council or what is known as the Upper House or the House of Review. Everyone who

thinks they know anything about government and voting patterns reckons that either Labor or the Liberal/Coalition government will win minority government. This is why the Inner Sydney Region matters. In order for the Liberal/Coalition to win a majority they need to hold what they have and pick up an extra seat.

For Labor to win majority government they will need to pick up an extra ten seats on top of what they have now. It's a big ask.

In order for the Liberal/Coalition to win with minority government they can afford to lose four seats and possibly six seats if Independent Alex Greenwich (City of Sydney) and Greg

Piper (Member for Lake Macquarie) supports them to form government.

In our region "The Teals" could be a problem for the Liberal Coalition. These women candidates are campaigning hard in the eastern suburb electorates once thought to be safe Liberal seats. If they do get elected they will likely help the Liberals' get over the line, so long as the Liberals support their climate agenda.

Are you confused yet? Don't be. Just know your vote matters and vote for an equal say and a fairer world.

Good luck and when you get a chance, pause and appreciate your right and responsibility to vote and join in on the celebration of democracy.

overty affects nearly 900,000 people in New South Wales – more than in any other state or territory¹.

Children, single women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and people with disability are the most likely to be living in poverty, economic and/or social disadvantage.

Single-parent families in Kensington, Pyrmont-Ultimo, Sydney-Haymarket, The Rocks and Waterloo have the highest rates of poverty in Sydney.

Housing stress in Sydney is at an unprecedented high with a disproportionate number of people in the private rental market living below the poverty line.

Whilst older people are less likely to be poor in general, the poverty rate amongst older people is highest in the inner suburbs such as Surry Hills, Redfern and Waterloo where there are large numbers of public housing tenants.

Some 41% of households in City of Sydney contained only one person, compared with 23.2% in Greater Sydney². Living alone is one of the most substantial risk factors for both social isolation and loneliness³.

WHAT IS ON THE MIND OF INNER SYDNEY VOTERS? WHAT ARE THEY LIKELY TO BE INFLUENCED BY?

There is varying and conflicting evidence about what are the most important issues for voters. We will of course know more after the 25 March but the sense is that voters in this region are likely to be influenced by:

HOUSING AFFORDABILITY

"... no way I can afford rent and even if I could - I can't find a place with all these trendies moving in and pushing up prices ..."

INTEGRITY IN POLITICS

People want our democracy to thrive but they are not "... putting up with bullshit and lies ..."⁵

CARE FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

" . . . we can turn this around. Stop coal, stop waste, stop high rates of consumption on everything . . ." 6

COMMUNITY MATTERS

"... if COVID taught us one thing – it's community who steps up when needed. We need to invest in community any bloody way we can . . ." 7

Inner Sydney Voice has taken the issues raised by local voices and researched needs. We have landed on what we think is important locally — see pages 7-8.



PRIORITIES FOR THE ELECTORATES OF BALMAIN, COOGEE, HEFFRON, KOGARAH, MAROUBRA, NEWTOWN, ROCKDALE, **SUMMER HILL, SYDNEY AND VA**

1 COST OF LIVING

Sydney is one of the most expensive cities in the world. People across the Inner Sydney Region are significantly impacted by the rising cost of living particularly in relation to affordable housing, utility costs and access to fresh food and produce.

- Work with Inner Sydney Regional Voice and the local community to develop and implement a community driven Cost-of-Living **Strategy**
- Advocate for a cost of living support package for low income earners and those experiencing housing stress
- Climate-proof all affordable housing stock to reduce onging costs

2 HOUSING RENTERS⁸

- Remove NO-grounds evictions. Everyone deserves stability
- Ban secret rent-bidding. All offers must be open and transparent to avoid pricegouging
- Create a Rent Commission that will identify, implement and enforce the rights of renters, whilst also investigating potential wrongdoing by landlords, creating a fairer rental market

HOUSING FIRST HOME BUYERS

■ Reduce barriers to first home ownership for lower income earners

- Call on a dramatic increase of investment in social and public housing stock from the NSW government
- Create a mandatory requirement that 30 per cent of all livable floor space in new developments (apartment and townhouses) be set aside for public and affordable housing

HOUSING

OLDER PEOPLE

- Fund a specialist older person's housing information and support service that comprises an early intervention and crisis response (similar to the Victorian Home at Last model)
- Invest in a better emergency response service to meet the needs of older people

3 IMPROVE OPPORTUNITIES FOR SOCIAL CONNECTION

BY ADDRESSING CAUSES OF LONELINESS AND SOCIAL ISOLATION

- Support Inner Sydney Voice campaign that shines a light on the impacts of loneliness and social isolation
- Esupport calls for funding of innovative, evidence driven, local strategies that identify and redress the causes of social isolation and loneliness. This includes paid employment for those at high risk of exclusion forom the workforce, volunteering, supporting and building sporting or community organisations, universal design of public spaces and amenities

4 COMMUNITY CENTRE INCLUSION AND INVESTMENT

Addressing community disadvantage needs investment. A little can go a long way. Community centres and local organisations can play a significant role in alleviating poverty, engaging with and including people at risk of exclusion.

- Legislate place-based collaboration for all government departments and key local services such as ISV, responsible for community development, health, education, the environment, social planning and transport
- Provide core funding to organisations like Inner

 Sydney Voice who can facilitate local engagement and connections and local service development capability for the expressed purpose of alleviating poverty and disadvantage
- Protect small and medium community organisations through better support and more equitable funding/commissioning processes





1 BALMAIN

- Held by The Hon Jamie Parker (Greens) since 2011, who is retiring
- Safe Greens 10.0% v ALP
- The electorate of Balmain covers 16.1 square kms and takes in all of the former Leichhardt Council area, absorbed into the new Inner West Council in 2016. The seat includes the suburbs of Birchgrove, Balmain, Rozelle, Lilyfield, Leichhardt and Annandale, as well as Glebe and most of Ultimo from Sydney City Council.

The electorate covers 14.6 square kms and includes the suburbs of Queens Park, Waverley, Tamarama, Bronte, Clovelly, Coogee, South Coogee, Randwick and parts of Bondi, Bondi Junction, Kensington and Kingsford. It covers the Randwick and Waverley Local Government Areas.

- Coogee is an eastern suburbs electorate bounded by Bondi Road and Syd Einfeld Drive in the north, Centennial Park and Anzac Parade in the west, and running down the coast as far as South Coogee. The electorate covers 14.6 square kms and includes the suburbs of Queens Park, Waverley, Tamarama, Bronte, Clovelly, Coogee, South Coogee, Randwick and parts of Bondi, Bondi Junction, Kensington and Kingsford. It covers the Randwick and Waverley Local Government Areas.




4 KOGARAH

- Marginal Labor 0.1%
- Kogarah is a southern Sydney electorate in the St George district. It extends north-west from Blakehurst and Kogarah Bay between King Georges, Harrow and Bexley Roads as far north as the M5. It includes all or parts of Beverly Hills, Kingsgrove, Hurstville, Bexley, Bexley North, Kogarah, Carlton, Allawah, Blakehurst, Kogarah Bay and Carss Park. Covers 22 square kms. Kogarah includes parts of the Canterbury-Bankstown and Bayside Local Government Areas.

5 MAROUBRA

- Held by The Hon Michael Daley (Labor) since 2005 by-election
- Safe Labor 8.3%
- The electorate of Maroubra covers the inner south-east coastal suburbs of Sydney in the Randwick and Bayside Local Government Areas. It runs along Anzac Parade from the Nine Ways at Kingsford to La Perouse and extends west as far as Southern Cross Drive. It includes Maroubra, Malabar, Chifley, Little Bay, Phillip Bay, La Perouse, Banksmeadow, Botany, Hillsdale, Matraville, Pagewood, Daceyville and parts of Kingsford and South Coogee. Less affluent than other seats in Sydney's east, Maroubra includes significant public housing estates as well as Port Botany and its surrounding industrial areas. Covers 46.9 square kms.



- Very Safe Greens 11.4% v ALP
- Newtown is the state's smallest electorate at just 10.8 square kms. It runs in a narrow strip from South Dowling Street to the Dulwich Hill light rail line at Lewisham, south of Parramatta Road and Cleveland Street with the main western rail line as its spine. The electorate includes Redfern, Chippendale, Darlington, Camperdown, Erskineville, Newtown, Enmore, Stanmore, Petersham, Lewisham and parts of Marrickville and Alexandria. Newtown covers parts of the City of Sydney and Inner West Local Government Areas.

- Rockdale is a settled St George district electorate in Sydney's southern suburbs. It covers the western side of Botany Bay, along the shore including the suburbs of Kyeemagh, Brighton le Sands, Monterey, Ramsgate, Sandringham and Sans Souci, as well as Arncliffe, Bardwell Park, Wolli Creek and Rockdale further inland. Covers 41.4 square kms. Rockdale includes Bayside and part of Georges River Local Government Areas.

Covers 18.7 square kms. It covers parts of the City of Sydney, as well as parts of the neighbouring City of Randwick and Woollahra Local Government Areas.

Covers 24.4 square kms. Vaucluse covers most of Woollahra and half of Waverley Local Government Areas.
